Time, Seasons and Holidays

The following book list coordinates with the calendar year. I've tried to arrange them with some thought to where holidays will land in a typical fall-to-spring school year, but this will not be perfect. Please rearrange as needed. Also, some months will have more suggestions in them (5 pairs of books instead of 4) to allow for those months when 5 weeks are available rather than 4 weeks.

I've also included and loosely coordinated books which allow students to dig a little deeper into topics presented by the picture books. These are the books labeled as NH (Natural History). Read one picture book and one NH (accompaniment) book per week on Day One according to the suggested Preparatory Weekly Schedule. The first book suggested will be read during the time allotted for Calendar Work and the NH accompaniment book will be read at the end of the day during the time allotted for Natural History; both books will be read on Day One. Alternatively, you could read the NH accompaniment book on Day Three during the time allotted for Natural History, either omitting Natural History on Day One or substituting other activities relating to Natural History.

This curriculum, especially for this level, is meant to be very flexible. Always do what is best for your young students, so substitute or add books of interest or similar topic as needed. These books are included as options and by no means are required reading. You could certainly omit all of the Natural History suggestions or just pick and choose what is available to you at the library or what is of interest to you and your students. Ultimately, the main source of study for Natural History occurs during the daily nature experiences, which are not scheduled but are assumed to be happening whenever possible. The Preparatory Level is designed to be a short day of listening to stories, having conversations and working on fine motor skills, allowing the remainder of the day to be free for children to discover and observe the natural world and free to play within the realm of imagination.
